## ZJ CZUPOR'S MYSTERY MINUTE: ON TOUR WITH DEAD WRITERS

ANSWER: Margaret Millar (1915-1994) was a pioneer in writing suspense novels about the psychology of women with often surprise endings. Most of her novels were "stand-alones" but she occasionally created a detective character for more than one novel.

Her novel Beast in View (1955) was adapted for Alfred Hitchcock's TV series Alfred Hitchcock Presents (1964) and Rose's Last Summer (1952) for Boris Karloff's Thriller (1960). For a while, her books were out of print but in 2016, Soho Syndicate re-issued many of her novels and some are available as ebooks.



In 1956, Millar won the Edgar award for Best Novel, Beast in View, and four later novels were also nominated for Best Novel: An Air That Kills (1957), The Listening Walls (1959), A Stranger in My Grave (1960), and The Fiend (1964).

In 1965, the Los Angeles Times named her "Woman of the Year," and Mystery Writers of America awarded her the "Grand Master Award" in 1983.

Her husband, Kenneth Millar, was a famous, award-winning writer of hard-boiled mysteries featuring private detective Lew Archer. He wrote his first four novels, all stand-alones but changed to writing as Ross Macdonald to avoid confusion with his wife who became famous as a writer before him. As a couple, they collectively produced fifty-three books in forty-five years.
